

What You Can Do to Build a Literacy Team



1. Visit the *Literacy in Learning Exchange* (www.literacyinlearningexchange.org) to inform literacy teaching in your school.
2. Build a commitment across your school to establish the organizational conditions that support literacy learning and help you earn recognition as a Center for Literacy Education.
3. Share your practices by participating in the Exchange, and collaborate with team members to deepen your professional learning and support student achievement across content areas.
4. Connect with teams across the nation to present your findings and learn from others by hosting or applying for funds to participate in live or virtual conferences and meetings.
5. Use research and guidelines generated by NCLE to support sustained literacy learning in your school and to inform administrators and elected leaders about policies that will advance your work.
